Through the use of readings, discussions, films, and debates, students will examine the cultural, social, economic, political, and technological currents that shaped Americans' relationships with their environment in early and later industrial eras, after World War II, and finally, in the late 20th and early 21st centuries. The basic issues to be examined will include the following: how people have lived in more natural places, such as farms and forests, as well as more built places, such as factories, cities, and suburbs. Events in the northeastern U.S. will provide a geographic focus, but the course will also look at related happenings elsewhere in the country and beyond. Finally, it will examine at the growing array of movements that have identified themselves as "environmental," at the "greenness" of modern culture, and at the environmental dimensions of a globalizing era.

COPAIGUE, NY College Writing is a study in independent research and argumentative writing, designed to help the student acquire and practice the research and writing skills that will be most helpful for him/her in college and beyond. Our primary watchword will be inquiry, in the form of asking questions, conducting research, and keeping an open, questioning mind with respect to the issues we will investigate and discuss. The student will become familiar with the research resources available to him/her as well as how to evaluate and use these resources. We will engage in an ongoing discussion of a topic area of the student's choice, including a focus on the World Wide Web as a research tool and an object of critical analysis. Our discussions and readings (to be agreed upon by both student and mentor) will provide a starting point for the independent research project that the student will conduct. The instructor will provide instruction on constructing sound, well-reasoned arguments. Emphasis will be placed on the student presenting arguments, reasons, and research in a manner that persuades an audience. This study satisfies the SUNY general education requirement in Basic Communication. It also satisfies the infusion of both competencies, Critical Thinking and Information Management.
