Animals in Literature 4 cr with Maureen Kravec

Animals have always played an important part in human lives and literature. As we attempt to understand our "other brothers," we reveal much about ourselves as well. Humans have revered animals as gods, abused them, used them for food, welcomed them into our homes as pampered pets, and destroyed their habitats and rights. Students will explore our complex, paradoxical relationship with animals, and our attempts to understand and explain them, through reading stories, poems, and essays. Written assignments will include a journal, four essays analyzing individual works, and a final research paper or creative project. Animal Studies is an emerging, interdisciplinary field, and an important aspect of this study will be your finding and engaging with scholarly articles

British Literature: Selected Topics 4 cr with Maureen Kravec

In this study, the student will read selected works of British literature in the context of its historical development. The primary text will be The Norton Anthology of British Literature, one volume edition; the student will supplement this text with other readings as individual interests develop. Each student will read the introduction to each section of the anthology. As a group, we will read and discuss Beowulf on the Moodle site; each student will then choose three additional areas of focus from a list, including but not limited to the following: traditional ballads; The Canterbury Tales; Renaissance literature -- selections from Shakespeare's contemporaries; John Milton, Puritans and Cavaliers; Dryden, Pope, and Neoclassicism; the birth of the novel; Romanticism; Victorians and pre-Raphaelites; and Modernism and stream of consciousness: Joyce Woolf, and Eliot. Because of the quantity of material available, and because the goal is to familiarize the student with British literature from a historical perspective, it is likely that the study will focus on pre-Modern works. Topics should be chosen according to interest and to allow the student to explore topics new to him or her. Each student will write critical papers, each approximately 5 pages in length. At least 2 of the papers should incorporate material from sources in addition to the literature. Students will be expected to share their insights through answering questions and journaling in the Moodle site.

Fundamentals of Public Speaking 4 cr with Marie Pennucci

The purpose of this study is to provide students with a foundation in public speaking. Students create and deliver 4 speeches to audiences, record the speeches and then submit online for review by instructor and other students. Students will explore the following: how public speaking differs from other forms of communication; types of speeches; organizing content; and delivery. Students must be able to record speeches and use course management systems to upload speeches for view by others in the study. Audience members are fellow classmates with the exception of 1 speech that requires a live audience. Each student must find and set up the live audience and record the speech for fellow classmates to view. By the end of this study, students should be able to self reflect on their own skills and establish realistic goals for improvement as well as understand how the face-to-face delivery mode differs from virtual presentations.

Principles of Environmental Sustainability 4 cr with Nikki Shrimpton

This is an interdisciplinary survey study designed to introduce some of the key concepts and thinking associated with environmental sustainability. Students will then learn how the biophysical world works, covering topics such as: natural laws; ecosystem organization and functions; material cycles; diversity and complexity; flexibility and adaptation; and short and long time scales. Students will learn about human subject research ethics, and the principles of qualitative research. In addition to other assignments, they will write two papers, one on the socio-political and historical circumstances that led to the conflict in question, and one that summarizes the results of a specific research project designed to learn about the lives of this refugee group during resettlement. Students will undertake a set of four interviews with refugee subjects, with the guidance of the course tutor. They will transcribe the interviews and write a paper on the results of their research.
