This study will examine the history of the Adirondacks through the lens of a critical paradox: how can humans preserve our natural beauty while allowing public access to these places? The study will first investigate the pull factors and industries of the Adirondacks and the effects on the conservation movements. Students will read William H.H. Murray's writings and explore historical promotional images of the Adirondacks. Murray, as well as other writers wrote of the beauty, solitude and intimacy of the nature and Adirondacks. We will examine these writings, to explore how and why this "tourist propaganda' facilitated in the creation of the "American Vacation." What do we really know about the narratives of American history? What does it mean to be female in America? This study will examine the narrative lives of women from the Colonial Period to the present day through their letters, narratives, and images. All of this will be placed within the context of the integral roles women have played in American history. By reading women's letters and other primary sources, students will obtain an understanding of U.S. history from a narrative perspective as told by women and perhaps gain a different or deeper understanding of historical events and the transformative roles women played in shaping those events. During this study, we will cover the themes of letter writing, communication and narrative; the concept of public and private; and consider the socio-economic status of women across the 18th, 19th, and 20th centuries and how that status is reflected in their stories. We will also explore how technology has impacted communication and "what's next" for women as they document and participate in future historical events as they unfold. A good understanding of U.S. history is helpful for this study, but not required. Learning Outcomes: 1. Understand the complexities of women's lives and roles. Women are not a homogeneous group. The women whose writings we will read came from different socio-economic groups, were different ages, lived in different regions of the country and therefore experienced life as an American woman differently. Yet, in those differences there are common themes that can be identified such as the duality of public v. private. Many of the letters we will read were never intended for public consumption and reveal women in some very intimate, heartbreaking as well as inspirational and uplifting moments. It is these moments that reveal the very real part women played in the evolution of the United States from colonial frontier to world super power. 2. Recognize that there is more than one narrative to history and the one that is most familiar to us may not be the history experienced by everyone. 3. Understand the value and use of primary sources in history and use them to gain a deeper understanding of U.S. history. 4. Understand the power of narrative and stories and how they can shape not only personal memory, but historical memory as well. This study meets the general education requirement for American History OR Humanities, not both.
