When Christopher Columbus sailed west across the Atlantic ocean from Europe in 1492, he was unaware of the indigenous American nations that were flourishing in the Americas. Through the lens of the arts, literature, technology and political traditions, we will examine pre-Columbian civilizations such as the Inca, Aztec, Mayan, Cahokian and Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) Confederacy, all of which rivaled those of Renaissance Europe. This study will refute the popular belief that the Americas were a pristine and primitive wilderness prior to European contact. This is a blended study with on-line assignments and three required meetings. The assignments will include weekly responses, discussion participation and a research paper. At the final meeting, students will present their research papers for group discussion.
